Mexican Food Recipe—From Roxy Colomb

LAYERED NEW MEXICAN ENCHILADAS

Ingredients

- 2 tbsp canola oil
- 2 lbs skinless, boneless chicken breast halves - cut into 1 in. pieces
- 1/4 tsp ground cumin
- 1/4 tsp chili powder
- 1 (19 oz.) can enchilada sauce
- 2 cups shredded lettuce
- 2 cups shredded Colby cheese
- 1 (12 ounce) package corn tortillas
- 1 onion, chopped
- 1/2 cup sour cream (optional)

Directions

Heat oil in a large skillet over medium heat. Add the chicken pieces, and cook until browned.

Season with cumin and chili powder.

Pour in the enchilada sauce, and simmer about 15 minutes.

Stir so it won't bake on.

In a separate dry skillet over medium heat, warm the tortillas.

Don't fry them, just warm them.

Assembly

Dip a tortilla in the enchilada sauce and place it on a serving plate.

Spoon some of the meat and sauce on and then add shredded lettuce, cheese, onion and top with sour cream.

Top with another tortilla that has been dipped in sauce.

Repeat at least three times.

Make additional stacks for each person.

If you like, you can add a fried egg (sunny side up) to each stack.

Makes enough for 6 people

Serve this with a Virgin Margarita

6 medium sized lemons

6 small limes

1/4 cup powdered sugar

1.5 cup crushed ice

1/2 litre lemon lime soda

1 thinly sliced lemon and lime

Squeeze and mix the juice of the lemons and limes

Combine the juice, powdered sugar, and crushed ice in a large container

Cover and freeze for at least one hour and up to a month.

Place the frozen mixture in a punch bowl

Slowly pour in the soda and add the lemon and lime slices. Serve in salt rimmed glasses

Ranch Hands Checking In

Since leaving The Ranch in mid September, we've been traveling in the truck camper for our first extended trip in the small rig and are actually still on speaking terms and haven't killed each other yet! Poor Samantha is frequently caught in the middle of things and has often taken to sleeping in the shower to avoid getting stepped on, poor ol' girl. She also loves having a shower curtain instead of the latching shower door in the big rig and sticks her head in the corner of the shower while I'm in there to lap up the water, and gets quite vocal if I try to shut her out of the bathroom. Strange cat, indeed.

We've done a fair amount of boondocking on this trip so we definitely got lots of practice conserving water and bundling up to keep warm on cool nights. Spent a couple of days on the Utah side of Dinosaur National Monument, marveling at the "Wall of Bones" at the Quarry Site, attending ranger talks, hiking up to see petroglyphs, and generally enjoying the scenery and star watching (except for the night we were visited by a skunk and I quickly retreated inside!) Then it was up and over the mountains to the Estes Park side of Rocky Mountain National Park for two days while we attended an elk workshop and learned everything you could possibly want to know about elk behaviors, the rutting season, etc., and then went out to view some of those things in the wild. We drove back over the mountains and stayed at Timber Creek CG, which was nearly empty at this time of year, and on several nights the elk basically took over the CG for some up close and personal pictures. Bugling sounds filled the air during our stay and we got some great pictures and video. Went to the ranger talks being offered, including one up at Alpine Visitor Center on the Trail Ridge Road at 12,000 feet, where we were in white-out snow conditions and blustery winds, resulting in the road being closed for part of the next few days.

Right now, we've been to RMNP twice, once at the end of May and now the end of September, and our viewpoint from that Visitor Center has been white-out conditions both times, so maybe sometime in the future we'll be able to actually see a view of the tundra... One day we hiked with a ranger in the rain and cold and my hiking boots

had so much mud on them they felt about ten pounds heavier than normal! We then headed back to Dinosaur, CO, and heard the final ranger talk of the season and drove the Tour of Tilted Rocks scenic drive for a picnic lunch.

As October rolled in, we drove over to the Needles section of Canyonlands NP for three nights. Although the "campground full" sign was posted at the Visitor's Center, as we were speaking with the ranger she got a radio call that one last site had opened up so she told us to hustle over there in hopes of getting it and we lucked out.

The weather was beautiful there and we did plenty of hiking on the shorter trails, but we were definitely not up to the physical demands of the 10-mile round trip moderate to strenuous hike to the confluence of the Green and Colorado Rivers. The rangers again gave some excellent evening programs on geology and all the plant life the Native Americans relied on for survival, and one night after the program Bill set up his tripod and took some excellent night sky pictures.

Rather than rushing over to Capitol Reef for only two nights, we decided to save it for a future trip and decided instead to camp out along the Colorado River Recreation Area on the Scenic Byway outside of Moab while we waited to rendezvous with our friend Karey. The scenery was absolutely stunning and we had a view of the river from our campsite, which was surrounded by towering red rock for fantastic morning and evening pictures.

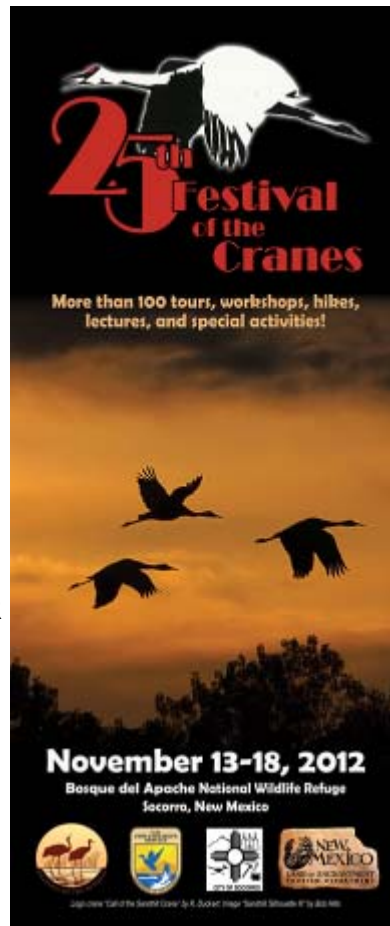
We all went to Red Cliffs Lodge for Sunday morning brunch to celebrate my 62nd birthday, and then went to settle into a Passport America CG in Moab for the next two weeks. The next day we headed to Arches NP, where Bill bought me my very own Senior Park Pass (definitely one of the perks of getting older!!) and began a hiking and picture taking spree throughout the area. We did the Island in the Sky section of Canyonlands and also did a half-day raft trip on the Colorado River (which, unfortunately, didn't have any whitewater rapids so late in the season), went to various petroglyph sites, and totally blew the diet for those two weeks. Bill enjoyed his Road Scholar photography class the second week while Karey and I relaxed and had some good girlfriend time, including time out for a massage day after my back went out and I had to pay a visit to the local Urgent Care for some much-needed muscle relaxants.

This weekend we both took the UTV drivers training session and were out in the dust and dirt on the training course, but it was a lot of fun and everyone in our group passed with flying colors.

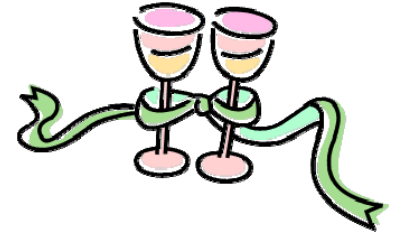

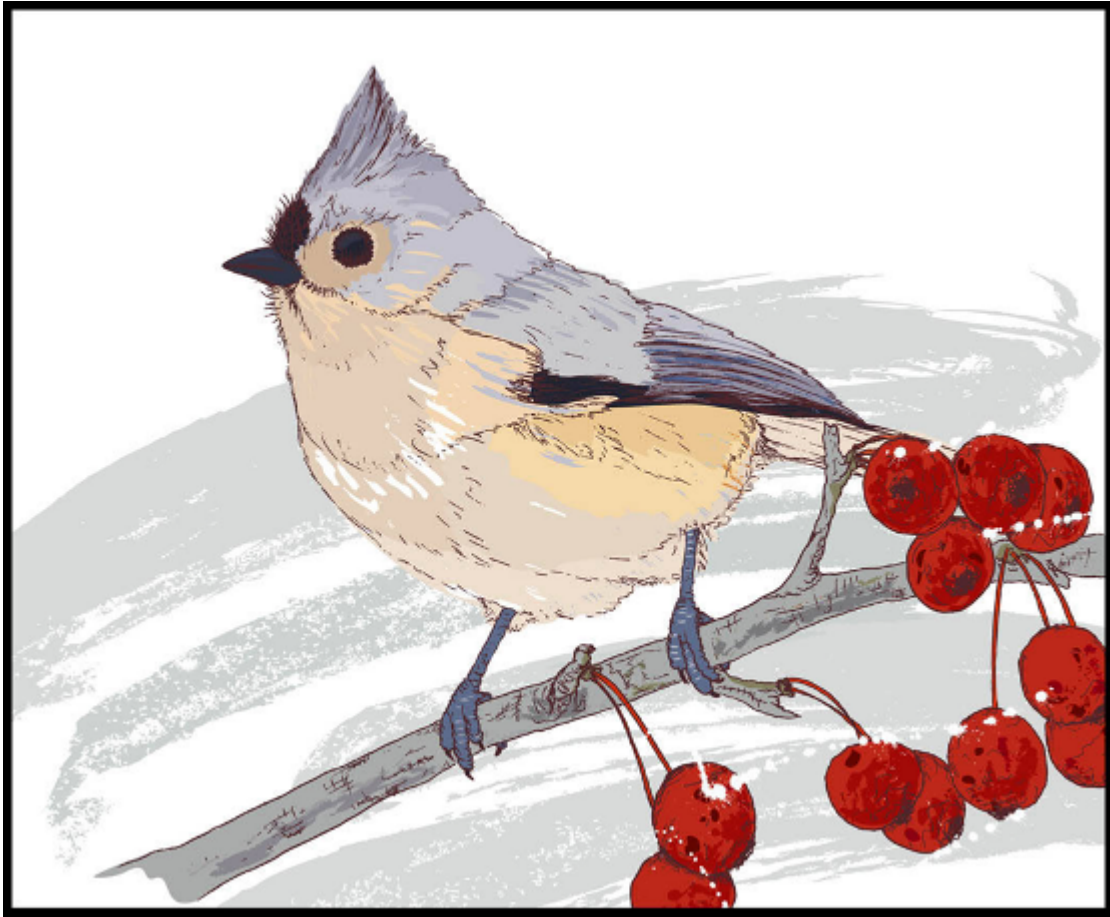
